**Re: Online Gaming**

## Protect your child's personal information

Talk to your children about what is meant by 'personal information'. Children need to know what is appropriate to share and what is not. Names, birthdays, age, address, contact information, photos with identifiable information such as school uniform and logo all count as personal information. While it is fun to engage in games with different players, children should retain a level of anonymity to protect themselves from those who might not have the best intentions.

- 1. Secure your child's accounts
- 2. Make passwords long and strong
- 3. Have your child/ren use an avatar rather than an actual picture of themselves

As a parent, you may sometimes feel worried about the feelings and behaviours your child experiences around gaming, as well as the amount of time they spend gaming. Along with many other families, you may be finding it difficult to create a healthy balance around screen time.
